REFLECTIONS ON TODAY'S GOSPEL THE VINE OF LIFE IN CHRIST

"I am the vine and you are the branches."

In today's Gospel we hear another of the great "I Am's" of Jesus. "I am the vine." Jesus first mentions that He is the vine in John 15:1: "I am the true vine, and My Father is the vine grower." There are a number of Old Testament references that speak of Israel being a vine, planted and tended by God. One reference is found in the Book of Isaiah, where the vineyard planted by God, instead of bearing good fruit, it withered from ignoring the life that God offered to them. We read in the OT Book of Isaiah 5:3-4:

"And now, O inhabitants of Jerusalem, and men of Judah, judge, I pray you, between Me and My vineyard. What more was there to do for My

vineyard that I have not done in it? When I looked for it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes? We also read in Isaiah 5:7:

"For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the men of Judah are his pleasant planting."

Against this background, Jesus speaks of Himself as the **True** vine, the One who gives witness unto the Father and bears good fruit unto His Father's approval and glory.

Now we can understand a bit clearer the importance of this verse, when Jesus declares Himself, as the "Vine" and declares to give life unto His believers.

The week before, He declared Himself as the "Good Shepherd," and today as the "Vine."

If God was to send His Emissary, His Ambassador to offer a "perfect" and final "sacrifice" for the accumulated sins of man, would He not send His Son as the "True Vine?"

The "prophets" of the Old Testament would foretell of the sending of His only begotten Son, who would be true source of life for believers. We are told by Him, in today's Gospel, that we are the branches connected to Him, drawing that life from Him; drawing from Him the necessary nutrients to survive, flourish and grow as followers of the "Way." We later learn that in the city of Antioch c.1st century the followers of Jesus were first called Christians.

In today's Gospel, we hear the words of Jesus: "Without me, you can do nothing?"

At first glance, we may assume that all branches bear fruit, but in reality it is only through the vine that makes all of it happen. The point is: that unless the branch is connected to the vine, it will not survive. Spiritually speaking, it is that connection which is needed for spiritual renewal; that while we strive to live in Christ, Christ is living in us.

But there is even more here in this short statement. When Jesus says that He is the Vine, it is the last of the great "I AM's, that He makes at the Last Supper as mentioned in the gospel of John.

The repeated use of "I am" brings to mind the name that God gave to Moses by which to call Him: "I am who I am" (Exodus 3:14). Jesus is stating that

He is the vine from which all life comes from and that He was indeed sent by God.

My dear brothers and sisters: We read in the Gospel of John 1:1-4, that all life in the created world came through Him: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life." Just as all life came through Him, rebirth, regeneration and eternal life comes from Him as well.



THE GLORIFIED CROSS

Last week, I spoke about the importance and the significance of the **Pascal Candle**, one of the symbols of Easter. I also mentioned that in the solemn procession on Easter Sunday, the Pascal candle is the first symbol to be carried behind the Processional Cross.

This week I would like to speak briefly on the second symbol of Easter and the second symbol to be carried in procession on Easter Sunday. It is the "Gloried Cross" of Christ.

Do you know that in the early history of man's inhumanity to man, and for many centuries, death by crucifixion was considered as the most feared and despised way to be put to death Originated by the Persians in the 6th century BC, it was a method of capital punishment used also by the Seleucids, Carthaginians, and Romans until the 4th century AD when Constantine the Great, the first Christian emperor abolished it in the Roman Empire out of veneration for Jesus Christ.

I have read, that the Cross was "shied away" from by the early Christians, as a symbol of shame, only later to become a symbol of redemption and salvation.

According to tradition, many of the Apostles of the Jesus were crucified including Peter and Andrew.

The importance of the "Cross of Christ" is found in the writings of St. Paul. I share with you four

scripture passages taken from his letters to the early church.

"For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power."

-1 Corinthians 1:17.

"But we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God."


- 1 Corinthians 1:23-24

"But far be it from me to glory except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world".

"And being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name."

APRIL 30 JOSEPH THE WORKMAN

Not much is known about Joseph outside of the Gospels of Matthew and Luke and is mentioned in the Gospel of Mark. In the 13 books ascribed to Paul, Joseph is not mentioned at all. Tradition holds that Joseph died prior to the public ministry of Jesus and he is not mentioned at the Crucifixion of Jesus. Throughout the centuries, Joseph is honored as the husband of Mary and the "protector" of his wife Mary and her son Jesus. As a just man, Joseph was first mentioned to have been visited by an angel in a dream, to take Mary, who was with child, to be his wife. He is later called upon to lead Mary and the infant Jesus into Egypt and again to return to Israel from Egypt following the death of king Herod. Finally, Joseph is mentioned when he, Mary and the young boy Jesus, age 12, went up to Jerusalem for the Passover. He was known in Greek as a "tekton" or a craftsman or builder in wood, stone or metal.

Joseph optimizes a righteous man and a devoted worker who cared for his family.



MAY 1st PHILIP THE APOSTLE

Philip, is one of the original twelve disciples of Jesus, His name, Philip, or in Greek (Philippos), suggests that he had a Hellenistic background, influenced by Greek thought, although he hailed from Bethsaida in Galilee, the same town as Peter and Andrew.

Philip is mostly mentioned in the Gospel of John.

One account of Philip is found in John 12:20-22:

"Now among those who went up to worship at the feast were some Greeks. So, these came to Philip, who was from Beth-sa'ida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; Andrew went with Philip, and they told Jesus."

It has been speculated that the Greeks approached Philip either because they knew him personally or that Philip spoke Greek.

Not to be confused with Philip the Evangelist as mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles, Philip the Apostle is believed t have gone to Greece, Syria and Phrygia in Asia Minor to preach the Gospel. According to tradition, Philip was crucified in Hierapolis, in Asia a part of the Roman empire, circa 80 AD.

His Feast Day: is celebrated along with St. James the Lesser, another Apostle of Jesus, on May 3 in the Western Christian Church.



MAY 1st JAMES THE LESSER

Not to be confused with James the Greater, the son of Zebedee, James the Lesser is believed to have been

the son of Alpheus and Mary. Mary is mentioned in Mark 15:40, as one of the women who was present at the Crucifixion of Jesus and at the tomb that first Easter morning.

Not too much is known of James the Lesser, but it is believed that he suffered martyrdom in the first century AD.

There is much confusion of exactly who James the Lesser was? Some biblical scholars such as St. Jerome stated that James the Lesser was a brother of Jesus, also known as James the "Just," who oversaw a gathering of the Apostles in AD 50. This James was martyred by being thrown off the temple parapet in 62 AD. Some accounts believe that James the "Just" was martyred by being beaten to death by clubs by an angry crowd.

Papias of Hierapolis, who lived circa 70–163 AD, in the surviving fragments of his work Exposition of the Sayings of the Lord wrote that Mary, wife of Alphaeus, is mother of James the Less.



MARIAM – "THEOTOKOS"

"MOTHER OF GOD"

It is in the month of May, that we give special devotion to Mary, the mother of the Lord, Jesus Christ. Both Matthew and Luke refer to Mary in their Gospel accounts as a "virgin." Christians throughout Christendom, believe that Mary conceived her son Jesus while still a virgin, through the power of the Holy Spirit.

The Gospel of Luke begins with telling the account of a young girl, who according to some biblical scholars, could have been as young as 14-15 when she was visited by the Arch angel Gabriel, who visits her and tells her that she was to be chosen to bear a son according to the Old Testament prophecies and that she was found to be in "favor with God."

It was in the Jewish faith, that young women would pray that if it was in God's plan, that they

might be the vessel to bring forth the "Redeemer." With the visitation by the Archangel Gabriel, according to our faith, Mary was the chosen one.

Throughout her life, Mary not only experienced the birth and the events surrounding the birth of her Son Jesus in Bethlehem, but she was also present at "Cross" of His crucifixion.

While she scolded her son, for not staying with the her and Joseph at the Passover in Jerusalem, when Jesus was 12, she is also believed to be among the women who came to finish the hurried burial right of her beloved son, following His crucifixion.

Mary has also been venerated, since early Christianity, and has miraculously appeared to many other believers over the centuries, from Mexico, France, Portugal, Yugoslavia and Egypt, Mary as honored in The Eastern and Oriental Orthodox, Catholic, Anglican and Lutheran Churches all profess that Mary is the "Mother of God."



MARYAM
"OUR LADY"

In Islam, Mary or "Maryam" is given the title "Sayyidutuna' or "Our Lady." She is also referred to as "Tahira" or "one who has been purified." It is also interesting that the Koran considers Mary as the greatest woman in all of creation and refers to her Annunciation: "Mary, God has chosen thee, purified thee; He has chosen thee above all women in creation." (Koran 3:42). It is also believed that she is the only woman in all of creation who was never tempted by Satan.

Devotions to Mary vary. In the PNCC, our liturgy has assigned the month of May to Mary, by reciting the "Litany to the Blessed Mother Mary," to saying the "Holy Rosary to Mary," or to saying the "Angelus," which is found in our prayer book, and traditionally said at 6 am, 12 noon and 6 pm. The following is the "Angelus to Mary"



THE ANGELUS

- V. The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary.
- R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary......
- V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord.
- R. Be it done unto me according to your word. Hail Mary......
- V. And the Word was made flesh.
- R: And dwelt among us. Hail Mary.....
- V: Pray for us, O holy mother of God.
- R: That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.



THE MAGNIFICANT

The Magnificat is Latin for "My soul magnifies [the Lord ") which is a canticle, also known as the "Song of Mary, the "Canticle of Mary" and in the Byzantine tradition is known as the "Ode of the Theotokos."

It is traditionally incorporated into the liturgical services of the Catholic Church, the Eastern Orthodox, as well as the Anglican and the Lutheran Churches.

For private devotions, it is usually said in the evening.

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, My Spirit rejoices in God my Savior For He has looked with favor on His lowly servant.

From this day all generations will call me blessed: The Almighty has done great things for me, And holy is His Name. He has mercy on those who fear Him In every generation.

He has shown the strength of His arm, He has scattered the proud in their conceit.

He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, And has lifted up the lowly.

He has filled the hungry with good things, And the rich He has sent away empty.

He has come to the help of His servant Israel For He has remembered His promise of mercy, The promise He made to our fathers, To Abraham and his children for ever.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

As it was in the beginning. is now and will be forever.

THE HAIL MARY

The Hail Mary is a traditional Scripture-based Catholic prayer of praise for and petition to the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God. It finds its origin as early as the sixteenth century, and it is recited following the Lord's Prayer and is the central prayer when offering the Rosary.
