THE HOLY TRINITY

Today, many Christian denominations celebrate the Solemnity or Feast Day of Trinity Sunday. It is a time where the Church, "the Body of Christ," celebrates the importance of the One God, as found and in three separate and divine persons: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

In the early years of the Christian Church, there were many debates, concerning the nature of the "Holy Trinity."

The concept of a "One God in three Divine Persons" first appeared toward the end of the first Century AD. An early Church Father, **Clement of Rome** (?-99 AD), asks in his epistle: "Do we not have one God, and one Christ, and one gracious Spirit, that has been poured out upon us, and one calling in Christ?" **Ignatius of Antioch** (? – 140 AD) provides his support for the doctrine of Blessed Trinity around 110 AD, teaching a faith, in the obedience to "Christ, and to the Father, and to the Spirit," **Justin Martyr** (100–165 AD) writes, "In the name of God, the Father and Lord of the universe, and of our Savior Jesus Christ, and of the Holy Spirit".

Other early Christian Church Fathers wrote concerning the Holy Trinity, and even to the present day, many modern-day theologians and biblical scholars continue to write books trying to explain the concept of the "Holy Trinity" to its people.

During the early years of the Christian Church, there were also many heresies which came forth, including many pseudo-canonical and gnostic writings, questioning many Christian theological issues, among them the true nature of Christ and the understanding of a "Holy Trinity. This would cause much confusion and separation in the early Church through much blood shed among fellow Christians striving to understand the "one faith."

The successors to the Apostles of Christ, the first Bishops of the Church, gathered in Nicaea (modern day Turkey) in 324 AD, to accept and adopt the standard of their faith, a creed that is known as the "Profession of Faith," or the **Nicene Creed,** which the majority of Christian denominations recite on Sundays, Solemnities and holy Days of obligation in the Christian Church, as one of their core belief.

I have heard that it is not about the existence of God that man debates about, but rather man's interpretation of God. It is there that we find differences, for God is Eternal to all of His creation and found in all religions to various degrees. In the first Seven Ecumenical Church Councils of the "Undivided Church," those who gathered were to address and define the relationship between God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit and put to rest several of these major heresies. It was at the First Ecumenical Church Council in Nicaea in 324 AD, that the Trinitarian formula of "Father, Son and Holy Spirit" was set.

When the "Great Schism" took place in 1054 AD it created two entities; the Western or the Catholic Rite, with its See in Rome and the Eastern or Orthodox Rite, with its See in Constantinople. Through this "schism," it separated the "Body of Christ" in its theology and understanding of the Holy Trinity.

From the "Encyclopedia Britannica." we learn that the term "Filioque," or in Latin: "and from the Son," was an addition to the "first" and original text of the Nicene Creed of 324 AD by the Western church and in the Middle Ages, it was considered one of the major causes of the "Great Schism" that happened in 1054 AD, between Rome and Constantinople.

The **"Filoque,"** I have read, was first used in 381 AD, in reference to a term which refers to the Son, Jesus Christ, who **"along with the Father,"** shared their relationship with the Holy Spirit.

As noted, the "**Filoque**" was not found in the original text of the Nicene Creed of 324 AD and at the First Council of Constantinople in 381 AD, it was declared that the "Holy Spirit" proceeds "from the Father," ("τὸ έκ του Πατρὸς έκπορευόμενον") without the addition "and of the Son."

In the late 6th century, some Roman or Latin Churches added the words "and from the Son" (Filioque) in description to the identity of the Holy Spirit, in what many Eastern Orthodox Christians argued was a direct violation to the First Council of Nicaea. This addition was added into the liturgical practice of Rome in 1014 AD but was rejected by the Orthodox or Eastern Rite.

In the Roman Catholic Church, it is declared that the Holy Spirit "proceeded from the Father (and the Son), who, with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified." This is the example which is known as the "Filioque" and as mentioned, was not included at the Second Ecumenical Church Council held in Constantinople in 381 AD.

The Eastern Rite, the Orthodox Church, kept the early Church teachings, declaring that the Holy Spirit "proceeded from the Father, who together with the Father (and the Son) is adored and glorified." In the PNCC, we agree with the teachings of the Early Undivided Church and with the Orthodox faith, in reference to the Blessed Trinity.

In the Sacrament of Baptism, we follow the words of Jesus who speaks in the Matthew 28:19: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,"

It was **Basil the Great** (330–379 AD) who writes: "We are bound to be baptized in the terms we have received, and to profess faith in the terms in which we have been baptized."

At the Second Council of Constantinople, held in 381 AD we also read, "This is the Faith of our baptism that teaches us to believe in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. According to this Faith there is one Godhead, Power, and Being of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

In the Protestant branch of Christianity, there are many denominations who hold to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity which includes the Anglican, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Methodist, Episcopalian, and the United Church of Christ.

There are also those who do not hold to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity as outlined in the early Church Councils. Among them are: Christian Scientists, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons), Jehovah's Witnesses, the Seventh Day Church of God, Unitarian Universalist Christians and others who do not hold to the belief of One God, in three separate & divine persons.

The essence of the Christian faith is built on the Holy Trinity. As celebrated in our liturgy, the importance of the Holy Trinity, is a divine plan for us to follow the Great Commission of the Jesus, as outlined in Matthew 28:16-20.



THURSDAY, MAY 30th SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI

"And Jesus said to them, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you."

- John 6:53

"He who eats My flesh and drinks My blood abides in Me, and I in him." - John 6:56

On Thursday. many Christian denominations will celebrate the Solemnity or Feast of Corpus Christi, Latin for the "Body of Christ". This feast day finds its origins dating back to the 13th century through the efforts of St. Julianna of Liege. Orphaned at age of 5, Juliana was entrusted in the care of the Augustine nuns, where she found a special veneration for the Blessed Eucharist. After having received a vision of Christ, she spent the next 40 years of her life, working for a special day that would commemorate the Most Blessed Sacrament. Up until that time, the Blessed Sacrament was remembered only during the sad season of Lent, on Holy or Maundy Thursday.

Today, upon consecrated altars, the simple elements of bread and the wine becomes for us and others the real Body and Blood of Christ, where Christ is mystically present. We recall the events of the Last Supper as found in Luke 22:19-20: "And He (Jesus) took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is My body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of Me." In the same way, after supper He took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in My blood, which is poured out for you".

The Holy Eucharist is a "sacrament" in our Church. and we learn from our catechism that a "Sacrament" is "an outward and visible sign of God's inward and spiritual grace, instituted by Jesus Christ, for our salvation."

St. Theodore of Mopsuestia, an Early Church Father who lived in the 5th Century wrote: "He [Jesus] did not say, "This is the symbol of My Body, or My Blood," but "This is My Body and My

Blood," teaching us not to look upon the nature of what is set before us, but that it is transformed by means of the Eucharistic action into Flesh and Blood."

We are all called before the table of the Lord to remember Him and the life He gave to each of us so that we might live and have fellowship with Him and with each other. Luke writes in the Book of the Acts of the Apostles 2:42 that: "They devoted [the followers of Jesus] themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer."

And so, as we celebrate Corpus Christi, the Body of Christ, may we remember that:

- The Body of Christ reminds us of His Sacrifice and that our salvation was bought and paid for by Jesus Christ when he died on the Cross.
- The Body of Christ reminds us that Jesus is the True Bread of Life and that whoever eats of this bread will never be spiritually hungry again. For He also taught that those who hunger and thirst after righteousness will be filled.
- The Body of Christ reminds us that we are all called upon to be His disciples, and that there is no distinction between persons when it comes to receiving Him.
- The Body of Christ reminds us that Jesus Himself desires that we share this most special gift with Him.
- The Body of Christ reminds us of the new Covenant, which was established by Him at the Last Supper, in which we recall His life and teachings.
- The Body of Christ reminds us that we all called upon by the Lord to have fellowship with Him and with each other.
- The Body of Christ reminds us that Christ will be with us until the end of time.

REFLECTIONS ON THIS MEMORIAL DAY

Amid the many cookouts, fireworks and gatherings of families and friends on this Memorial Day, which for many, marks the beginning of summer and amid all the "Memorial Day" sales, if you need great deals on furniture, appliances, or the purchase of a new car, many other families and friends will gather on this day, pause and remember the "fallen."

In retrospect:

On May 8th of this year, our country marked and celebrated the 79th anniversary of V-E Day, or the "Victory in Europe," the day when WWII came to an end in Europe against the "NDAP" or the Nazi regime under Adolph Hitler.

According to the U.S. Department of Defense, 104,812 American ground troops lost their lives in action in Europe during WWII, while another 42,500 military personnel were killed at sea or in the skies.

 On September 2nd of this year, our country will mark the 79th anniversary of V-J Day. the victory over Japan, the day that WWII came to an end with the empire of Japan s aboard the battleship Missouri.

According to the U.S. Department of Defense, over 41,592 soldiers and 23,160 Marines and sailors, died in the Pacific theatre during WWII.

It is estimated that 116,518 American soldiers died during WWI, after the United States entered the WWI in 1917.

During the Korean conflict, it is estimated that over 36,000 U.S. military servicemen lost their lives. In Vietnam, another 58,220 U.S. military veterans died; it is also reported that 4,431 Americans died in the Iraqi War while another 2,459 U.S. soldiers died in the war in Afghanistan, It should also be noted that these figures do not even mentioned of what took place in Somalia or other places of conflict nor does this mention of all those veterans who were wounded in battle, both physically and psychologically.

A day remembering those who fought for our freedom and democracy has unofficially been celebrated throughout the history of our great nation. Officially, Memorial Day was first established in 1868, as "Decoration Day," a day where loved ones placed flowers at the gravesites of the fallen of the American Civil War which lasted from 1861-1865. During the American Civil War, it is estimated that over 620,000 died on both sides, with estimates as high as 750,000 killed.

On this Memorial Day, we pray and remember members of many families who lost mothers and fathers, sons and daughters during times of war.

Of the 16.5 million Americans who served during WWII, it is estimated that only 116,580 veterans are still alive today. down from 326,000 veterans who were still alive in 2022. Sadly, it is estimated that over 131 veterans from WWII die each day with most veterans in their 90's.

Memorial Day is a time whereas a nation, all Americans should pause to remember all veterans, many from our families who served in the Armed Forces. So many names of American veterans are inscribed on the headstones in cemeteries around the world, along with the display of the American flag. And finally, there are countless others whose names are known "but to God."

On this Memorial Day, we honor all those veterans who gave their lives as their "final measure," as coined by our 16th President, Abraham Lincoln, during his visit and dedication of a National cemetery in Gettysburg PA, on November 19, 1863. The following is his address, which consisted of only 272 words, and was delivered in two minutes. It should be noted that the previous speaker, Edward Everett, spoke for over two hours.



THE GETTYSBURG ADDRESS

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live.

It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate—we cannot consecrate—we cannot hallow—this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract.

The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced.

It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."
