THE WIDOW' MITE THE GREATEST OF ALL GIFTS – YOURSELF

In today's Gospel, we hear of the story of a poor widow and her giving of two coins or mites. This story is found in both the Gospels of Mark 12:42-44 and Luke 21:1-4.

We hear that Jesus was sitting in the Temple one day near a collection box. Many people came in and dropped their offerings for the temple. Those who were rich put in large amounts, but this poor widow had given only two small coins. These coins were also known as a "leptons." Its value was about 1/64 of a denarius or one-eighth of a cent. A denarius was considered the average day's wage for a commoner,

Jesus' comment to His disciples was that the widow had put in more than the other people. The majority had put in out of their excesses, she had given all that she had.

As we learn in scripture, Jesus, and many of the religious leaders of his day did not get along. Jesus saw their hypocrisy and, in many instances, would call them out. It could be said because of His truthfulness, the religious leaders saw in Jesus a threat and in the end, they were the ones who were instrumental in His death by crucifixion. It is ironic that Jesus would condemn the scribes in these words and afterward a widow comes into to the temple.

"Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes and like greetings in the marketplaces and have the best seats in the synagogues and the places of honor at feasts, who devour widows' houses and for a pretense make long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation." (Mark 12:38-40.)

So, what can we learn from today's story:

Lesson #1: The attitude of one's heart

The scribes, Pharisees, and Sadducees had shown by their actions that their hearts were in the wrong place. We see this in Jesus' condemnation of their attitudes in Matthew 25. Though they appeared to follow the Law of Moses, they were arrogant in their dealings with other people and their hearts lacked mercy and compassion. The poor widow, in comparison, understood true sacrifice. She loved God so much in her heart, that she gave Him all she had.

Lesson #2: Faith

Jesus watched the people as they made their offering. And yet, it was this poor widow's offering that was significant to Him. As a widow, she would have been dependent on the generosity of those others as outlined in Deuteronomy 24:19-21. There was no social security in the days of Jesus. The significance and importance of her offering was that she could have used this offering in other ways. Did she not consider her offering that could have been used to

purchase something she really needed for survival? Did she not consider hiding it away for a time for some greater need? The Bible does not say. What we do know is that her ultimate decision was to bring it to the Temple.

This poor woman gave all she had, once those two coins dropped into the box, that was it. There was nothing else to sustain her. I am sure she had no accumulated wealth. The widow gave, not because she could, but because she wanted to. It was a sacrifice out of love for her God.

Though she was poor, she became an example of living her faith. By giving of this gift, she displayed her belief that God would supply all her needs. This is faith.

Jesus was to remind His followers these important words as found in Matthew 6:25,33: "Take no thought of what you will eat or what you will drink or what you will put on. But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added to you."

As Christians, we are all called upon to live in a certain manner: not to deceive others or pretend we are better than others. In 1 Peter 2:9, we read: "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." Our Lord, Jesus Christ calls each of us to be not only His witnesses on earth but also His disciples.

Jesus showed us by example the way God would have us live. This become apparent in the early Christian community as described in the Acts of the Apostles 2:44-47: "All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved."

As children of God, we are called upon to make our lives as living sacrifices to the Father and to glorify Him as His only begotten Son Jesus did.

Jesus gives to all of us this day, in the story of the widow the cost of true discipleship and stewardship. The truth that Jesus taught is that God is more concerned with the state of one's heart when we give than He is with the amount that we offer. In the end, it can be said that when our hearts are centered on God, everything else will fall into place.

"I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." - Romans 12:1



THE HISTORY OF VETERANS DAY

World War I – known at the time as "The Great War" - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words:

"To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

The original concept for the celebration of Veterans Day, was for a day to be observed with parades and a suspension of all public meetings and a brief suspension of all business, which began at 11:00 a.m.

The United States Congress officially recognized the end of World War I when it passed a concurrent resolution on June 4, 1926;

Whereas the 11th of November 1918, marked the cessation of the most destructive, sanguinary, and far-reaching war in human annals and the resumption by the people of the United States of peaceful relations with other nations, which we hope may never again be severed, and

Whereas it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this date should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations; and

Whereas the legislatures of twenty-seven of our States have already declared November 11 to be a legal holiday:

Therefore, be it Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), that the President of the United States is requested to issue proclamation calling upon the officials to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on November 11 and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples.

The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed on October 25, 1971. On September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978.

Some quick facts about our veterans:

- 1. Veterans are people who served in the military (US Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard) in times of war or peace.
- 2. Currently, there are less than 120,000 who served all through World War II, one million veterans who served in the Korean War, and about six million who served in the Vietnam War. Each year there is a significant drop in living veterans.

- 3. In the United States, Veterans Day is celebrated on November 11 every year, the same day that World War I hostilities formally ended (at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The holiday was originally known as Armistice Day before President Dwight D. Eisenhower officially renamed it Veterans Day in 1954.
- 4. Veterans Day, which pays tribute to all veterans, both living or dead, differs from Memorial Day, during which we pay tribute to those who lost their lives in combat.
- 5. There are over two million female veterans currently living in the US.
- 6. Presently there are over 14 million male veterans who are presently living
- 7. The states with the highest veteran populations are California (1.56 million), Texas (1.46 million), and Florida (1.44 million).
- 8. Presently, the unemployment rate for veterans who served post-9/11 was 3.5% the lowest recorded rate since 2008.
- 9. There are over 11.7 million veterans who are over the age of 65, which is about 61% of all veterans and climbing each year.
- 10. According to the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs, as of 2024, there are over 47,925 veterans who are homeless an increase of over 16.9 %. Presently there are over 15,507 veterans living without any shelter.
- 11. According to statistics from the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs there are over 70% of veterans experiencing homelessness as well as experiencing substance abuse, and over 50% live with mental illnesses like post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

May we all be grateful for the service that all our veterans, both men and women have given to our great nation and may we all and offer our prayers for both the living and the faithful departed. Other veteran facts:

- Demographics: According the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), there are over 20.5 million U.S. veterans and over 9 million of them who are enrolled with various VA health services, which include 170 VA Medical Centers and 1,063 outpatient sites. While many veterans come in for standard care and more serious illnesses like heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and cancer, there are also battle issues unique to their service for our country: "Veterans experience mental health disorders, substance use disorders, post-traumatic stress, and traumatic brain injury at much higher rates as compared to their civilian counterparts," says Maria Olenick, PhD, RN, and Professor at Florida International University. Over the span of a year, more than 1.1 million veterans were treated for mental health issues, according to a study published in the American Journal of Public Health. Their illnesses can include depression, substance use disorder, anxiety, schizophrenia or bipolar disorder to name but a few.
- Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD): In the American Civil War it was known as "soldier's heart." During World War I, it was known as "shell shock" In WW2 it was known as "combat fatigue and beginning in 1980, the American Psychiatric Association gave this condition another name; Post-traumatic stress disorder with symptoms such as flashbacks to traumatic events, nightmares, sleeplessness, anxiety, and depression. PTSD is one of the most common health issues vets experience, says Olenick. Trauma-induced stress is almost four times more often than in civilians; 36 percent of male veterans versus 8 percent of non-veterans,
- Traumatic brain injury: with the use of Improvised Explosive Devices of IED's, Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) can result. With the result of a significant blow to the head or body. Symptoms can include severe headaches, fatigue, drowsiness, memory problems, and mood changes and mood swings," according to the National Alliance of

Mental Illness. While a mild concussion is most common, "there are actual changes to the brain that occur from an even a mild traumatic brain injury," says Olenick.

- Chronic pain: Sadly, chronic pain is one of the most reported symptoms by veterans returning from recent overseas military actions, according to the NIH: It is reported that over 82 percent of veterans that returned from Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom reported chronic pain. Recent studies published in the journal *Medicine*—reveals a link between chronic pain and substance abuse.
- Substance use disorders (SUDs): Military service is stressful, and that stress has been shown to increase the risk of veterans having issues with drugs, alcohol and nicotine abuse. In many veterans, SUDs co-exist with other conditions like pain, depression, and insomnia. SUDs can lead to increased risk of suicide, with one study of military personnel suggesting that 30 percent of all suicides among veterans were preceded by alcohol or drug use.
- Suicide: According to 2021 Brown University study, it is estimated that over 30,177 veterans of post 9/11 conflicts have committed suicide. This rate of suicide among veterans is 1.5 times higher than the non-veteran population. More than two-thirds of male veterans used a gun.
- Amputations: Since 2010, it has been reported by the Federation of American Scientists, that over 1600 veterans have suffered the loss of major limbs from amputation due to battle injury, While advances in emergency care has improved survival rates for soldiers, amputation is still a risk and can lead to trauma, personal distress, anxiety, and depression, along with substance abuse.
- Hazardous exposures: In various military conflicts, U.S. veterans have been exposed to extremely dangerous substances—from mustard gas in World War I to Agent Orange

in Vietnam; there's also severe air pollution from burn pits, smoke, and the dust of battle. According to the VA, these exposures can raise the risk of health problems years later. Veterans of the Gulf War continue to suffer from mysterious chronic illnesses; it will take some time before veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan can know the health consequences of the various substances to which they were exposed during service.
