THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT "A Candle of Peace"

"The voice of one crying in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord.'" - Isaiah 40:3

Last Sunday, we lit the first candle on our Advent Wreath. This candle represented "Hope."

"Hope," as mentioned, is defined as "a desire with expectation of obtainment." I spoke last week of how there was a hope, a deep longing and an expectation for a Deliverer, a Messiah, who was promised by God and who would redeem His chosen people. This Savior, who's coming into the world, was spoken in the books of the Old Testament by the Prophets, the spokesmen of God, such as Isaiah, Jeremiah, Micah, Daniel, and Malachi.

Today, the second candle on our Advent wreath is lit. It represents "Peace." We read in the Old Testament, of the struggle of the children of Israel. From their enslavement in Egypt, to their deliverance by God through Moses; from their wandering in the wilderness for 40 years to finding

a land of "milk and honey" in Canna; from the first destruction of the temple in Jerusalem in 587 BC, by the Babylon king Nebuchadnezzar, the history of the Jewish people, would continue in the New Testament where Rome would be the ones to enslave the Jews. Again, there was a renewal of a desire of hope and that God would hear their cries and fulfill His promise to them. We are told that this Deliverer and Redemer, as spoken by the prophets, would not only bring hope to God's chosen but also peace.

And so, in our faith in God's divine plan, He heard the cries of His people, and He would answer their prayers. Out of the wilderness, we read, there came a man, named John, who came with a message. It was a message of hope, about the One who would bring peace. Just as a "shofar," or ram's horn, was sounded announcing the coming of the Jewish holy days, of repentance, the voice of John the Baptist also spoke of "repentance" and the coming of a Deliverer. It is interesting that even today, the "shofar" is sounded to mark the beginning of the two holiest days in Judaism; Rosh Hashana, and Yom Kippur; times that were and are set today for people of the Jewish faith to set aside time for fasting, prayer and repentance. John's call was like the sounding of the shofar, for John, who Jesus called John a prophet, spoke also of "repentance."

His message would echo the words spoken by the Prophet Isaiah 40:3-5:

"A voice proclaims: In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be lifted up, every mountain and hill made low; The rugged land shall be a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken."

"A voice of one crying out in the wilderness." We are living at a time in our world, in our nation, and in our communities, that this message of Jesus and most importantly the significance of this message is not heard and taken to heart. God gave us a promise of hope that Christians find in "the Word made flesh," in the Lord Jesus who came with a message from the Eternal God, the creator of all.

There are some, who believe what is taking place in our world today is the "birth pangs" of the beginning of the "end times" We heard words of warning from Jesus as we ended the liturgical year of 2024 from the Gospel of John 18:33-37 on the Solemnity of Christ the King and the beginning a new liturgical year, the First Sunday of Advent from the Gospel of Luke 21;25-28, 34-36.

With the increase of violence in our streets, "road rage" on our highways, and "air rage" in our skies, I believe that we should all take a step back and consider the severity of all these negative and destructive actions, that humankind emulates.

Should we not also, all take a couple of steps back of the result of such hostilities:" which we read on the last Sunday of the Christian Church, the Solemnity of Christ the King as well as the First Sunday of the new Liturgical year, as found in Holy Scripture and seek a peaceful resolution without pointing fingers and considering ourselves "selfrighteous" The radical, racial, and social injustice committed against one another, the economy struggling to "upright" itself, and the millions who are still homeless. hungry and will not even be able to put a simple Christmas gift under a tree for their child. And then there is the selfishness of politics, all those senators and representatives who seek to advance their own political careers So much divisiveness, so much anger, so much chaos. January 6th, 2021, with an act of insurrection, proved how far we are from peace. Have things gotten better? I believe that the Spirit of God, has touched so many in our congregation to strive to live the "Gospel" of Jesus and give to others in need. I believe that when we are faithful in our devotion to the Lord, He guides us to others, where we can share what we have experienced in the growing of our personal relationship with the Lord.

If there was any time where humankind needed to stop and listen to that one voice crying out in the wilderness, is now. John led a simple life and had two simple messages. "Repent" and "Prepare the way of the Lord." Saint Bernard wrote that there are actually three comings of the Lord. The first was at Christmas, when Jesus came as the "Prince of Peace" to redeem humankind. The third time will

be at the end times when the Lord will come to judge humankind. The second time is when Christ is born within one self; to give hope and peace through difficulties.

"Prepare the way of the Lord" is a timeless message to all who would seek and call upon God to be in their lives. But with this, we all must individually be on guard not allow ourselves to be distracted by the influence or the chaos of this world. It is a message that St. Paul spoke about in his letter to the Christian Church at Philippi:

"I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus. God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the affection of Christ Jesus. And this is my prayer: that your love may increase ever more and more in knowledge and every kind of perception, to discern what is of value, so that you may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God."

My brothers and sisters: "Prepare the way of the Lord" is today's message. It is a message of peace. It is a message that calls upon all of us to hearken to that inner voice that speaks to us in the depths of our being, who came to us as the breath of God. But how do we prepare the way of the Lord?

In St. Paul letter to the Romans, he sets forth a formula to successfully prepare the Way of the Lord: "Do not conform yourselves to this age but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and pleasing and perfect."

We prepare the way of the Lord, my brothers and sisters, when we love more and hate less, when we learn not to judge others more harshly than we judge ourselves, when we learn to be more forgiving as Christ taught John ushers in the one who would bring peace and stability. Did not our blessed Lord say: "Peace, I leave you, my peace I give unto you, not like the world gives, but as I give unto you.' May you prepare spiritually and find peace and tranquility within as we "prepare the way of the Lord."



JOHN THE BAPTIST: WAS HE REAL OR FICTIONAL?

"[And] the word of God came to John, the son of Zechariah, in the desert. John went throughout the whole region of the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah: "A voice of one crying out in the desert, Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight His paths. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low. The winding roads shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

- Luke 3:2b-6

It is at Advent, that we are introduced to John the Baptist. But a question is asked: Did John the Baptist really exist? What proof, outside of Holy Scripture, do we have, that he was more than just a biblical character in Holy Scripture.

One of the greatest historians of that time. was Flavius Josephus (c. 3 - 100 AD), a Jew, we read that he, among many things was a scholar, and a historian. One of his most famous writings is" the **Antiquity of the Jews**, where he writes:

"Now some of the Jews thought that the destruction of Herod's army came from God and was a very just punishment for what he did against John called the baptist [the dipper]. For Herod had him killed, although he was a good man and had urged the Jews to exert themselves to virtue, both as to justice toward one another and reverence towards God and having done so join in washing. For immersion in water, it was clear to him, could not be used for the forgiveness of sins, but as a sanctification of the body, and only if the soul was already thoroughly purified by right actions. And when others massed about him, for they were very greatly moved by his words, Herod, who feared that such strong influence over the people might carry to a revolt -for they seemed ready to do anything he should advise -- believed it much better to move now than later have it raise a rebellion and engage him in

actions he would regret. And so, John, out of Herod's suspiciousness, was sent in chains to Machaerus, the fort previously mentioned, and there put to death; but it was the opinion of the Jews that out of retribution for John, God willed the destruction of the army to afflict Herod." The writing of Josephus not only gives insight into the times that John the Baptist and Jesus lived in, but most importantly gives credence, merit, and validity to Holy Scripture which historical account that John the Baptist was real and more not just a character as found in the Bible.

REMEMBERING THE SAINTS AND THE MARTYRS OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

I would like to share with you, some of the Saints and Martyrs of the Christian Church that we will remembering this week during our Holy Mass.



MONDAY, DECEMBER 9, 2024 Solemnity - Conception of the BVM

The Eastern Christian Church first celebrated the "Feast of the Conception of the Most Holy and All Pure Mother of God" on December 9, perhaps as early as the 5th century in Syria. By the 7th century, the feast was already widely known in the East. It spread from the Byzantine area of Southern Italy to Normandy during the period of Norman dominance over southern Italy. From there it spread to England, France, Germany, and eventually Rome.

In 1568, Pope Pius V revised the Roman Breviary, and though the Franciscans were allowed to retain the Office and Mass. Furthermore, the pontiff of the Roman Catholic church, requested that the "papal bull" be notarized in the Holy See to be further be copied and reproduced for dissemination.

Prior to Pope Pius IX's definition of the "Immaculate Conception" as a Roman Catholic dogma was instituted in 1854, where most missals referred to this "Feast of the Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary."

The observance of this Feast Day, "the Conception of the BVM," is celebrated in various degrees with the Anglican, Oriental Orthodox, Eastern Orthodox, Roman Catholic and the PNC churches.



TUESDAY, DECEMBER 12, 2023 Solemnity of our Lady of Guadalupe

Did you know that there are several parishes in the PNCC whose Pastors celebrate the Holy Mass of the Eucharist in the Spanish language and whose congregations are mostly Mexican?

In the Liturgical Calendar of the PNCC, we find that December 12th is a day aside to observe the **Solemnity of Our Lady of Guadalupe**. But what is the story that most of us do not know concerning Our Lady of Guadalupe?

"Our Lady of Guadalupe," or in Spanish, "Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe," is also known as the "Virgin of Guadalupe."

This Solemnity recalls the apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in her appearance to Juan Diego in a vision in 1531 AD. Juan Diego was later to be canonized as a saint in the Roman Catholic Church. Our Lady of Guadalupe holds a special place in the religious life of Mexico and is one of the most popular religious devotions. Her image has also played a significant role as the national symbol of Mexico.

According to tradition, Mary appeared to a farmer, Juan Diego, who was an Aztec convert to Christianity, which took place on December 9th and again on December 12th, 1531 AD. During the

first apparition of the Blessed Mother, Mary requested that a shrine to her be built on the spot where she appeared on Tepeyac Hill (now in a suburb of Mexico City).

In historical accounts, the bishop demanded a sign before he would approve the construction of a church. However. Mary then appeared a second time to Juan Diego and ordered him to collect roses.

In a second audience with the bishop, Juan Diego opened his cloak, letting dozens of roses fall to the floor and revealing the image of Mary imprinted on the inside of the cloak—the image that is now venerated in the Basilica of Guadalupe.

A shrine to the Virgin has existed on this site when archbishop of New since 1556 the Spain promoted devotion to the image of Mary at a chapel in Tepeyac. The story of Mary's appearance to Juan Diego was codified in the work of Miquel Sánchez in 1648 AD, and an account in the indigenous language (Nahuatl) was published in 1649 AD and widely accepted as accurate. The devotion continued to grow, especially after Our Lady of Guadalupe was credited with ending a deadly epidemic of hemorrhagic fever that ravaged Mexico City in 1736–37.

In 1737, "Our Lady of Guadalupe" was proclaimed patroness of Mexico City, and in 1746 her patronage was accepted by all the territories of New Spain, which included part of present-day California as well as Mexico and regions as far south as Guatemala and El Salvador. Veneration of Our Lady of Guadalupe has been particularly strong among women, especially in Mexico, and since at least the early 18th century, the devotion was spread throughout the world by the Jesuits and other religious orders.

Our Lady of Guadalupe's role in Mexican history is not limited to religious matters; she has played an important role in Mexican nationalism and identity. In 1810 Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla promoted her as the patroness of the revolt he led against the Spanish. The image of the Virgin of Guadalupe appeared on the rebels' banners, and the rebels' battle cry was "Long Live Our Lady of Guadalupe." During a religious revival in Mexico in the late 19th

century, preachers declared that the foundation of Mexico could be dated to the time of the apparition of Our Lady of Guadalupe, because she freed the people from idolatry and reconciled the Spanish and indigenous peoples in a common devotion. Emiliano Zapata's peasant rebels carried the banner of Our Lady when they entered Mexico City in 1914, and, during the civil war in Mexico in 1926–29, the banners of the rebels bore her image.

Her continuing significance as a religious and national symbol is attested by the hundreds of thousands of pilgrims who visit her shrine every year.



FRIDAY, DECEMBER 13, 2024 Lucy, Virgin and Martyr

Blessed Saint Lucy, also known as "Lucia of Syracuse: who lived c. 284–304 A.D, was an early Christian who was martyred during the persecution of Christians during the reign of the emperor Diocletian.

Blessed Saint Lucy is one of the most highly venerated saints in Christianity and one of only eight women, who is mentioned by name in the earliest Canon of the of Catholic Church.

The other seven virgins and martyrs mentioned by the early church were saints "Felicity, Perpetua, Agatha, Agnes, Cecilia, and Anastasia."

Accounts of her life differ, but most religious scholars agree that Lucy was martyred after a disappointed suitor reported her as being a Christian to Roman authorities.

Blessed Saint Lucy was born c. 283 AD to wealthy Roman parents in the area of Syracuse, Italy. Her father seems to have been a Roman nobleman, while her mother, Eutychia, had Hellenistic or Greek roots. When Lucy was five years, old, her father died, leaving Lucy and Eutychia without any support.

It is believed that Lucy was a Christian from her early life. As a young girl, she knew that she would be expected to marry and that there was a dowry set aside for her. However, she secretly consecrated her virginity to God, and she had hopes of being able to lead a celibate life and give her dowry away to the poor. Lucy's mother, Eutychia, was either unaware of her daughter's vow or was concerned for her future as a single woman of the Christian faith. Eutychia arranged a marriage for Lucy, betrothing her to a young man from a wealthy pagan family. Part of the sudden betrothal was due to Eutychia's poor health. She suffered from an unknown bleeding disorder and wanted to secure her daughter's future quickly.

It has been written, that because of her illness, Eutychia made a pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Agatha, a Christian martyr, from an earlier era of Roman persecution. While the women were away on pilgrimage, Lucy reportedly experienced a vision of St. Agatha in her dreams. The vision told Lucy that her mother would be cured because of Lucy's great faith and that Lucy would achieve glory and honor. Eutychia returned home, her health improved significantly. Lucy shared her vision with her mother and asked for permission to distribute most of the wealth from her dowry to the poor. Eutychia tried to convince Lucy to give the riches away in her will, rather than right away. Lucy declined, explaining that true charity meant giving her riches away while she was still alive, not when she was dead and had no further use for them.

Word of Lucy's plans to distribute her dowry reached her Roman fiancé, who denounced her to the Roman authorities. Paschasius, the Governor of Syracuse, ordered Lucy to prove her devotion to the empire by burning a sacrifice to an icon of the emperor. Lucy refused.

Paschiasius sentenced Lucy to be raped in a brothel as punishment for her refusal. Christian tradition states that the soldiers sent to take her away to rape her, they were unable to force her to move, even though they outmatched her in physical strength. Tradition states that Lucy was assigned to burnt alive, but the flames did not burn her. She then had her eyes removed through torture by her Roman captors and finally killed with a sword thus decapitating her. Tradition finally states that, when her body was prepared for burial in her family's mausoleum, her eyes were miraculously restored.

By the 6th century, the story of St. Lucy had spread through the Christian world, to the point that she was mentioned in the first Roman Canon of Holy Mass Her feast day was celebrated across the Christian world until the Protestant Reformation and subsequent schisms. Today, she is venerated in the Roman Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican, and Lutheran churches as well as our PNCC.

She is also the patron saint of Syracuse in Sicily, Italy, where she spent her short life. The island nation of Saint Lucia, located in the Caribbean, also considers Saint Lucy as their patroness.
