LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD

A READING FROM THE BOOK OF NEHEMIAH THE PROPHET (Nehemiah 8:2-4, 5-6. 8-10)

Ezra the priest, brought the law before the assembly, which consisted of men, women, and those children old enough to understand. Standing at one end of the open place that was before the Water Gate, where he read out of the Book from daybreak till midday, in the presence of the men, the women, and those children old enough to understand; and all the people listened attentively to the book of the law. Ezra the scribe, stood on a wooden platform that had been made for the occasion. He opened the scroll so that all the people might see it, for he was standing higher up than any of the people and, as he opened it, all the people rose. Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people, their hands raised high, answered, "Amen, Amen!" Then they bowed down and prostrated themselves before the LORD, their faces to the ground. Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read. Then Nehemiah, that is, His Excellency, and Ezra the priest-scribe, and the Levites, who were instructing the people, said to all the people: 'Today is holy to the LORD your God. Do not be sad, and do not weep,' for all the people were weeping, as they heard the words of the law. He said further: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our LORD. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!"

A READING FROM THE FIRST LETTER OF PAUL TO THE CORINTHIANS (1 Corinthians 12: 12-30)

Brothers and sisters: As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit, we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit.

Now the body is not a single part, but many. If a foot should say, "Because I am not a hand I do not belong to the body, " it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. Or if an ear should say, "Because I am not an eye I do not belong to the body, "it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God placed the parts, each one of them, in the body as he intended. If they were all one part, where would the body be? But as it is, there are many parts, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I do not need you, " nor again the head to the feet, "I do not need you." Indeed, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are all the more necessary, and those parts of the body that we consider less honorable we surround with greater honor, and our less presentable parts are treated with greater propriety, whereas our more presentable parts do not need this. But God has so constructed the bodys to give greater honor to a part that is without it, so that there may be no division in the body, but that the parts may have the same concern for one another.

If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part is honored, all the parts share its joy. Now you are Christ's body, and individually parts of it. Some people God has designated in the church to be, first, apostles; second, prophets; third, teachers; then, mighty deeds; then gifts of healing, assistance, administration, and varieties of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work mighty deeds? Do all have gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret?

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO SAINT LUKE (Luke 1:1-4; 14-21)

"Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses, from the beginning and ministers of the Word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received.

Jesus returned to Galilee, in the power of the Spirit, and news of Him, spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all. He came to Nazareth, where He had grown up, and went according to His custom came into the synagogue on the sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He has anointed Me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord. Rolling up the scroll, He handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at Him. He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

RELECTIONS ON TODAY'S GOSPEL

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He has anointed Me, to bring glad tidings to the poor."

We read, that Jesus was baptized by John the Baptizer, in the Jordan River. c. 27 AD, early in the "fifteenth year" of Tiberius. His baptism was to be recorded in all four Gospels

We also read in the Gospel of Luke, that Jesus, after being baptized by John, where he [John] witnessed and testified the coming of the Holy Spirit unto Jesus.

In Luke 1:14, we read: "Afterward, Jesus returned to Galilee, in the power of the Spirit, and news of Him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all."

We read, that Jesus, goes back to the town of Nazareth, where He was raised as a child, and at the age of 30, the age which has been related as coming into manhood as well as the age of priests and prophets, enters the main synagogue in Nazareth for worship. He is handed a scroll and turns to the prophet Isaiah 61:1-2 of the Old Testament and proclaims:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He has anointed Me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord."

We further read that He gave back the scroll to the attendant and proclaimed: "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

I wonder what the Learned, those who were gathered that day, must have thought of this declaration and proclamation. Many of us would think there was a happy ending to this story, but His declaration did not bring praise, but rather condemnation.

"They began to ask: "Is He not the son of Joseph? Jesus answered their blindless inquiries and narrowness and said, "Verily I say unto you, no

prophet is accepted in his own country."

I think one of the valuable lessons found in today's Gospel, are people, even when they hear truth, question the source and choose not to accept it. But, Jesus declared that the Lord sent Him to "proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of the sight to the blind." I believe that the "recovery of the sight of the blind" was not limited to His healings of those who suffered from physical blindness, but rather Jesus came as the "Light of the World" to bring "enlightenment and illumination" to all those who lived in darkness and would hear and have faith in His teachings and witnessed to His healings.

We read, that the end of the 4th chapter of Luke, things got worst for Jesus before they began.

"And all they in the synagogue, when they heard these things, were filled with wrath, and [they] rose up, and threw Him out of the city, and led Him unto the brow of the hill upon which their city was built, that they might cast Him down headlong. But He, passing through the midst of them, went His way and came down to Capernaum, a city of Galilee, and taught them on the sabbath days."

And so, we come to read and understand in John 1:11:" He came unto His own, and His own received Him not."



EZRA & NEHEMIAH

Ezra was a priest and Nehemiah was a chief and scribe. They were contemporaries and their books complement each other.

In the beginning they formed one book in the Hebrew Canon and in the Septuagint Greek. Both books place an emphasis on the rebuilding of the temple in Jerusalem, the priesthood, and the worship of the exiles from Babylon.

In a historical sense they form three distinct time periods. In Ezra 1-6, the history of the return colony to Jerusalem, form the first arrival of the 42,360 exiles under Zerubbabel and Joshua in 536 BC till the dedication of the temple in 516 BC. In Ezra 7-10, it describes Ezra's arrival in Jerusalem in 536 BC

and the reforms he introduced. In Nehemiah 1-13, it speaks of the joint activities between Ezra and Nehemiah in rebuilding the walls in Jerusalem during the Nehemiah's first visit to Jerusalem in 445 BC. More particularly, in Nehemiah 8-10, the first public reading of the law and the celebration of the Feast of the Tabernacles takes place and in Nehemiah 11-13, it lists the princes, priests and Levities when Nehemiah revisits Jerusalem in 432 BC. Both books cover a period of 103 years (536-433 BC). During this time, we are also introduced to Esther, a most famous woman who also wrote an Old Testament book.



THE BODY OF CHRIST

I personally believe, as I am sure that for many, church leaders, that one of the most important terms that binds all Christians and churches together is the phrase "The Body of Christ."

Today, we hear again, from the Apostle Paul, who speaks in his First Letter to the people of Corinth, of the "correlation" of the various parts of the physical body and how they correspond to the importance of unity. Paul spoke of "spiritual" gifts and various ministries, through the "manifestation of the Spirit" as a member of the "Body of Christ."

We are reminded of last week's second reading, also taken from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians where he writes:

1 Corinthians 12:4-11

"Brothers and sisters: There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit. To one is given through the Spirit the expression of wisdom; to another, the expression of knowledge according to the same Spirit; to another, faith by the same Spirit; to another, gifts of healing by the one Spirit; to

another, mighty deeds; to another, prophecy; to another, discernment of spirits; to another, varieties of tongues; to another, interpretation of tongues. But one and the same Spirit produces all of these, distributing them individually to each person as He wishes"

This reading also calls upon all to seek these gifts, for the sanctification and the edification of the" Body of Christ," which is the Church.

Saint Paul, who is known as an "Apostle to the Gentiles," compliments Saint Peter, who is known, as the "Apostle to the Jews." They both brings the "Good News" of Jesus.

In my study, I am currently reading from the New Testament, in the Revised Standard Version of the Holy Bible of Paul's Letter to the Romans, which tells of the salvation of the Jews and the Gentiles, whether circumcised as with the Jews through the covenant with God and Abraham and the Gentiles, who were uncircumcised and had not covenant with God as with Abraham. Beginning with chapter 2 of Roman and continuing through chapter 3, we begin to see what is known as "justification by faith." In Roman 3:21-24, we read:

"But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, ²² the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ^[d] for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²³ since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴ they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus."

Eloquently Paul, in his letter to the Romans unites all, both Jew and Gentile into the Body of Christ, being defined in his letter to the Ephesians 4:5-6 as the "One Faith, one Lord, One Baptism,"

In today's second reading, we hear Paul who continues to speak in his 1st Letter to the Corinthians 12:12-13 and continues to verse 31:

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit."
