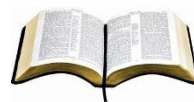

(Isaiah 11:1-10)

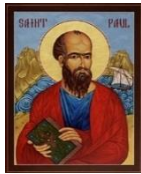
On that day, a shoot shall sprout from the stump of

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

(Matthew 3:1-12)

John the Baptist appeared, preaching in the desert
of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of
heaven is at hand!" It was of him that the prophet
Isaiah had spoken when he said: A voice of one
crying out in the desert, Prepare the way of the
Lord, make straight his paths. John wore clothing
made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around
his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. At
that time Jerusalem, all Judea, and the whole region
around the Jordan were going out to him and were
being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they
acknowledged their sins. When he saw many of the
Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he
said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned
you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good
fruit as evidence of your repentance. And do not
presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as
our father.' For I tell you, God can raise up children
to Abraham from these stones. Even now the ax lies
at the root of the trees. Therefore, every tree that
does not bear good fruit will be cut down and
thrown into the fire. I am baptizing you with water,
for repentance, but the one who is coming after me
is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his
sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit
and fire. His winnowing fan is in his hand. He will
clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into
his barn, but the chaff he will burn with
unquenchable fire."

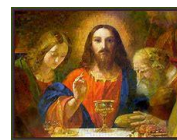

REFLECTIONS ON

THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

THE CANDLE OF PEACE

The second candle in Advent, has been
 called the "**Candle of "Peace,"**" as well as the
"Candle of Preparation."

The season of **Advent** or "**Adventus**" began as
 early as the 6th century in Spain and Gaul (France).

In the early Church, the **Second Sunday of Advent**, was also designated as the **“Sunday of Preparation.”**

This preparation was not only to mark the celebration of the “coming” of the Lord at Christmas but was also to be a time where individuals would prepare to be baptized as new Christian converts on the Feast of the **Epiphany of our Lord** (January 6th). The emphasis was to remember not only the celebration of God’s incarnation of the **“Word made flesh,”** but was also to remember the visit of the Magi, and John baptizing Jesus, in the Jordan River, circa 30 AD.

During Advent, individuals would through prayer and fasting, prepare themselves to receive the birth of the Lord. In the beginning years, there was little connection, between the seasons of Advent and Christmas, and it was not until the Middle Ages that Advent and Christmas would be linked together.

On this **2nd Sunday of Advent**, we meet the great teacher and prophet John, the Baptizer. He was called upon by God to **“prepare the way of the Lord.”** But John did not call the repentant in a gentle manner but was more like a “drill sergeant” in a marine barracks, greeting the new recruits on their first day. John was honest, seeking to fulfill his ministry to God, through the miracle of his own birth and as well as his time in the desert, in austerity, and he did not mess around with people who he baptized, in the River Jordan

Years ago, I saw a beautiful production of the “The Miracle of Christmas” at the Sight and Sound Theatre in Lancaster, PA. In this performance, the importance of the birth of the Son of God is preceded by the story of the Angel Gabriel coming to Zechariah to tell him that his wife Elizabeth would bear a son and that he would name John. The archangel Gabriel would play an important part in the Christmas story, for he not only visited Zechariah but also Mary, the Blessed Mother of our Lord and Joseph, her espoused husband.

Common tradition holds that since Mary and Elizabeth were related, then Jesus and John must have been cousins. But who exactly was John the Baptist?

The emergence of John the Baptist was like the voice of God breaking a silence that lasted for over 400 years. The last time a prophet spoke in the Old Testament was Malachi. He conveyed to his listeners a message from God: “Now I am sending my messenger—he will prepare the way before me; And the lord whom you seek will come suddenly to his temple; The messenger of the covenant whom you desire—see, he is coming! says the LORD of hosts”. And so, John was born. Not only did John the Baptist have something to say, but it was the way he delivered it. He was primed and ready. He had spent years in the wilderness, living as a hermit, living off the land and striving to understand what he was called upon to do. From his birth, as we read in the Gospel of Saint Luke, he was another miracle of God. John was to possess no wealth, but his message was to be priceless. John was to be a great prophet in the Christian tradition, chosen by God to be the processor of the Light, “who was to enlightens every man who comes into the world”. If we look at the person of John the Baptist, it can be truly being said that:

1. John fearlessly defined his position. If John saw ordinary people living a godless life, he told them about it. If the orthodox religious leaders, the Pharisees and the Sadducees were corrupt, he told them about it. John even went as far as to denounce publicly King Herod, who had taken his brother’s wife and were living in sin. John didn’t care if he offended people. He simply told the truth and brought to light the darkness of man’s sins.

The Roman philosopher Diogenes one time said: “The Truth is like a bright light to sore eyes” and that “he who never offended anyone, never did anyone good.” The time of politeness was gone, and a time of rebuke had come, and John called it as he saw it and he didn’t “beat around the bush.”

2. John called upon people to be righteous. His message was not merely negative denunciations; it was a positive call to all to live the moral principles of God. He not only denounced men for what they did; he summoned them to do the things that was

right. He not only condemned men for what they were; he challenged them to be what they could be. He was a voice calling men to a higher standard. He not only denounced evil and wrong but also set before man the good.

As the theologian William Barclay put it: “There are times when the Church was too pre-occupied to tell man what not to do and too little occupied in setting before man the Christian ideal. Christianity calls upon each of us to raise our own personal mark.

3. John lived beyond himself. John not only was a light to illuminate evil, a voice to rebuke sin, but he was also a signpost, a neon light pointing to God. It was not that he himself wanted others to see; he only wished to prepare others for the one who was to come after him. It was the Jewish belief that Elijah would return before the Messiah came, and that he would be the herald of the coming of the king. In last book of the Old Testament, the book of Malachi 4:5, we read: “Behold, I will send you Elijah the prophet before the great and terrible day of the Lord come.” John, who wore a garment of camel hair and had a leather belt around his waist was the exact raiment that the prophet Elijah wore as in the book of Kings.

It could be said that John the Baptist represents the innate nature in each of us that looks to do good. It is that moral principle within each of us which that brings to light that which prevents us from being righteous “unto the Lord”. It is that which draws men to live a moral and upright life, but who still lacks the spiritual comprehension of our oneness with God. John baptized with water, a purifying agent that is used in all religions.

John used water to baptize man unto repentance and the forgiveness of sins. “I baptize with water, but there is one among you, who you do not know. He is the one who baptizes in the Holy Spirit and with fire”.

When one is truly baptized in the Holy Spirit they are sealed and set aside as God’s chosen.

Our Parish has been involved every year and the generosity of our parishioners have made the Christmas holidays special for so many in our communities.

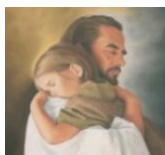


OUR ANNUAL SOCK DRIVE
